



### **Pastor's message – The “Next Big Thing”**

At our council's “vision and mission” retreat, one of the council members noted this difference between Messiah now, and Messiah ten to fifteen years ago. He said that Messiah has always looked to accomplish the next big thing—which means taking on something larger than it could reasonably achieve.

Like purchasing the land on which Messiah rests. “Seemed impossible to me,” he remembered. But it got done. The renovation of Messiah House—by ourselves—that appeared to be too big a bite to chew. But it got done. Then raising funds to build a church, to be a mission base. So far fetched it was ridiculous! But it got done. Plus another lay-led capital campaign—to reduce debt. One of the hardest types of fundraising there is. But it got done.

The difference between us then and now, this council member conjectured, was that now we don't have that “next big thing.” The thing everyone thinks impossible—but isn't—thanks to the Spirit moving through Messiah. We need to be challenged.

I think he's right. Messiah responds well in such challenging situations, and even seems to draw energy from them. What I don't think we realize is that we have faced an enormous challenge in the past four years. Looking back now, I can see that we were involved in “the next big thing.” This one wasn't as evident as building a worship center, or as exciting. But it was something that we had to pass through to continue on to the future we all desire for Messiah.

This next big thing, that many young congregations find difficult if not impossible to achieve, is becoming what in the New Testament is called a *koinonia*. Koinonia is a “partnership” in which each has a share, and each gives a share. It is an intentional community that is marked by each individual's participation. It implies a working relationship with each other and an active relationship with God. Koinonia is fellowship with Jesus Christ through the sacraments.

In short, it's figuring out who we are, how we relate one to another, what our purpose is, and how we can work together. It doesn't come with hammers and nails, with mortgages or mortar, with catchy slogans, goals to meet, or with fanfare at the finish. It comes with struggling to get along—listening to each other, disagreeing but not disassociating, forgiving and being forgiven. It comes with sacrifice of one's wants over the church's needs. It comes with figuring out budget woes and property dilemmas and policy mix ups. It comes with learning to prioritize one's life, centering it on Christ, and participating in the mission of the church. It comes with the body and blood of Jesus Christ Son of God, given and shed for you.

When you see all that's involved, you realize how impossible Koinonia could be. It was, hands down, the next big thing for Messiah as we settled into the new worship space and were faced with the question—now what? And while nothing seemed to present itself and consequently you thought you were drifting, dissolving into a flood of problems and set backs, you were in actuality forming the bonds, negotiating the processes, and shedding the negativity—all needed to create a more focused and missional church. A koinonia.

Did it get done? For the most part I think yes. But I also realize that, by its very nature, a Koinonia is always a work in progress. So I won't stop striving for it—and neither should any of you. Yet the basics are strongly in place, we've learned a lot about working together. And that can't help but assist Messiah as it approaches its “next big thing.”

Which is?

Celebrating God's Faith , Hope and Love.

## Ash Street Shelter Recipe of the Month Golden Chicken Casserole

2 cups cubed, cooked chicken  
1 (20 ounce) can unsweetened pineapple chunks, drained  
1 (12 ounce) jar apricot preserves or spreadable fruit  
1 (10.75 ounce) can condensed cream of chicken soup, undiluted  
1 (8 ounce) can water chestnuts, drained  
Hot cooked rice (Make 10 servings of rice)

In a bowl, combine the first five ingredients. Transfer to a greased 2-qt baking dish. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees F for 30 minutes or until heated through.

Rice can be served separately or you can combine everything in a larger dish (13" x 9") pan.

## **NEWS FROM ANNE MARIE HOUSE:**

This was observed and written by our president. If you have 2 minutes, please read:

One evening at AMH, while on duty as a volunteer, I observed the families around me. A dad sat in the dining room feeding his 4 month old, while his wife kept their 2 older girls occupied with stories and games. In another corner a family of five sat around a table: mom and dad had a conversation about something involving 3 ring binders, the 2 younger children did homework and the oldest, a teenager, didn't hang around long--found him later in the library on a computer. Just outside the dining room, an older child was running the vacuum cleaner and in the living room the usual flock of younger kids watched TV in the company of a parent and another volunteer.

Anne Marie House makes childhood as normal as possible by shielding kids from the worst effects of homeless, such as food insecurity or exposure to unhealthy situations. In addition, we provide children and their families with warm beds to sleep in, wholesome meals, access to transportation and other supportive services. We nurture our families via a supportive and caring network of more than 1,000 trained volunteers while providing the necessary guidance for our families to attain sustainable housing independence.

We all find that we get much more than we give. We see this as the joy that can only come from reaching out to others. It is not always easy to say "YES" to volunteering; but if you speak to someone who does, you too, will feel that joy. Marge

**The BIG Day!** We will celebrate the (approximate) anniversary of our chartering as a Lutheran church on Nov. 20<sup>th</sup>, with a festive Eucharist with Bishop Payne presiding. Followed by a meal. Know any ex-pat Messiah-ites? Let them know they're invited too!

## **Stewardship – The Offering, by Dick Lange**

The liturgical placement of the offering is one that often causes debate. It has become more complex over time as it is unclear for whom the offering is taken! Obviously, the offering is not given to God (though we sometimes encounter presiders and assisting ministers who raise the gifts up to some imaginary high altar as if they giving the offering to God up there!). Offering was never collected for God or for the parish itself; but for the poor.

This is clear in documents dating back to the second century written by Justin Martyr. After the celebration of Holy Communion, "The wealthy who are willing make contributions, each as they please, and the collection is deposited with the presider, who aids orphans and widows, those who are in want because of sickness or some other reason, those in prison, and visiting strangers—in short, the presider takes care of all in need."

Unfortunately today, what gets put in the offering plate is primarily for self maintenance. We are giving to ourselves with a certain percentage (usually small) designated for mission or the wider church. This contradicts the intent of the offering.

One of the primary recommendations of the early Reformation Kirchenordnungen (the Church Order) was that there always be a common chest for the poor. After a lengthy chapter on the use and misuse of the mass (and instructions on how the mass should be enacted), Pastor Johannes Bugenhagen (Luther's own pastor) writes about the necessity of a common chest. He clearly echoes the second century text by Justin Martyr. The line from the celebration of Holy Communion to the common chest is strongly suggested, just as Luther makes the same connection in his critique of the brotherhoods who celebrate Holy Communion only for themselves and not for the good of their neighbor. Almost copying Luther, Bugenhagen writes, "All the trials, he writes, of body and soul of our brothers and sisters, whether rich or poor, should be mine." Sharing in the sacrament of Holy Communion immediately spills over, so to speak, into a sharing in humanity's plight.

Reviving this meaning of the sacrament implies renewing our practice of offering. The possibility today of contributing our pledge through online services is a wonderful opportunity. Our offering for the maintenance of the parish, its pastor and staff, etc. can now all be accomplished simply and effectively and regularly. This frees the moment of the offering during the Sunday worship to be truly an offering for the neighbor, the poor and all in need. (*Lang is Associate Professor of Worship at Luther Seminary. 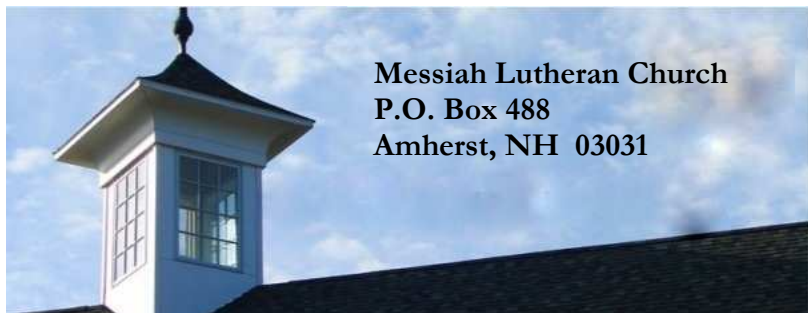
